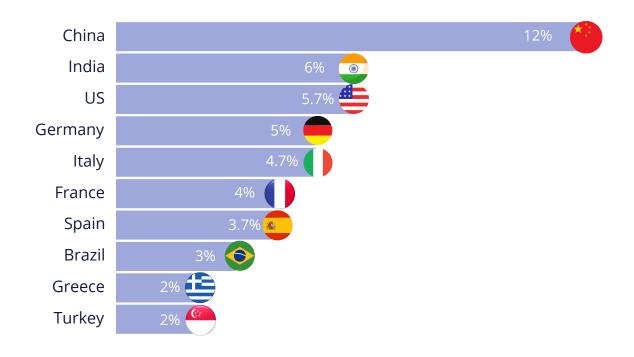

# Top nationalities interested in studying in the Europe in 2025



Unsurprisingly, **European audiences** account for the largest share of global search interest in European study, making up **41% of total searches**.

The next highest regional share comes from East Asia (14%), with **China** representing a significant portion of that interest. In fact, China is the largest single source of searches, accounting for over 12% of all global searches.

There are strong levels of interest in European study also from India and the U.S.

#### **Student motivations**

The top motivation for students wanting to study abroad is to develop their skills, with 42% of students saying it was their top motivating factor. This reflects the strong importance students place on gaining practical capabilities that support employability and career-readiness.

Closely following are motivations related to career progress (38%), career entry (36%), and to qualify for further study (33%). These responses collectively suggest that students continue to prioritize outcomes that support long-term professional and academic advancement, with institutional prestige or rankings playing a less central role.

# Students wanting to study in Europe consider the program before the school

We asked: Which do you consider first?

The program remains the most important first choice factor, with nearly half of international students prioritising it when considering a European study destination. This 'levels the playing field' for smaller or less-known institutions - the program is more important than the school's standing.

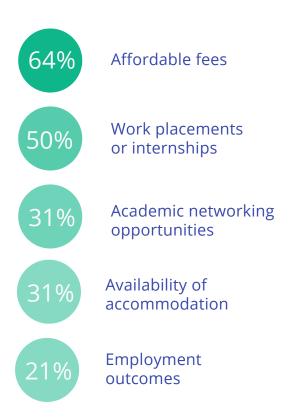
Influence is moving away from country level (28% in 2024, dropping to 22% in 2025) and increasingly towards the school level (rising from 25% in 2024 to 32% in 2025).

The suggests students are becoming more targeted in their approach, starting with the specific program that interests them and working backwards.



## Most important factors in a degree for students

Affordable fees are the most important factor for international students wanting to study in Europe, with half of students citing internships as their top factor.



We have an employability adviser in each of our campuses at Schiller, and they oversee internships for our students. But not only this, they are putting our students in contact with companies from day one, by bringing companies inside our classrooms and involving companies in our academic model.

Our academic model is challenge based learning, so students are working on real challenges with real companies... We don't wait for an internship to put students in contact with a company.

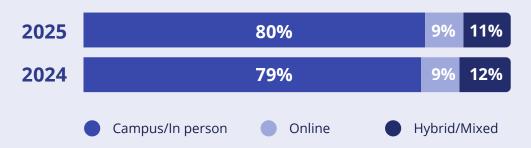

### **Flexibility**

On-campus study remains the overwhelming first choice for international students. Globally, we see a shift towards online study, but it seems that is yet to happen in European destinations.

#### Influences

#### How do students perceive Europe?

To better understand why students want to study in Europe and specific European countries, we surveyed students to find out how they rate their chosen country on various factors (listed in the table below).

Overall, Europe outperforms the U.S when it comes to how safe and politically stabile students perceive it to be, with 45% ranking Europe as 'very good', compared to 34% for the U.S.

Students believe Germany's institutions have a strong reputation, with 51% saying the reputation is 'very good', while there is a strong cultural pull to both France and Spain. Perception of safety in the Nordics is high, with 58% of students ranking their chosen Nordic study country as 'very good' for safety and political stability.

# Top factors influencing students' decisions to study in Europe

Students are showing a growing focus on the practical outcomes of their studies, with the largest increases in perceived influence for factors such as course content, costs, and post-study work opportunities.

Overall, this suggests that students are increasingly evaluating the return on investment (ROI) of their study choices, carefully weighing how courses translate into tangible benefits for their future careers.

#### The influence of student reviews

With peer-to-peer communication on the rise, we asked students if they take reviews into consideration in their decision-making, with **38%** of students saying they did 'a lot'.

**Email** remains by far the most popular channel for prospective students who want to study in Europe.

However, when we look at our global dataset of all 42,000 students, we are seeing that email has decreased in popularity since 2024 - which is mirrored for students interested in Europe.

In its place, in-person communication has tripled in popularity, and instant messaging (such as WhatsApp and Facebook Messenger) has increased from 9% in 2024 to 13% in 2025.



### **Application stage**

When it comes to international students wanting to study in Europe, they tend to 'cast the net wider', with around 65% applying to 3+ or more institutions in 2025.

# Over half of students take fewer than 6 months to research study options

#### **Accessibility of information**

With easier access to information, it is no surprise the majority of prospective students are spending **less than six months** researching study options before submitting an application.

Since we began collecting data in 2021, we have been able to track the student application journey becoming progressively shorter. Meanwhile, medium- and long-term research timelines remain stable or slightly down, showing fewer students are taking a year or more to plan.





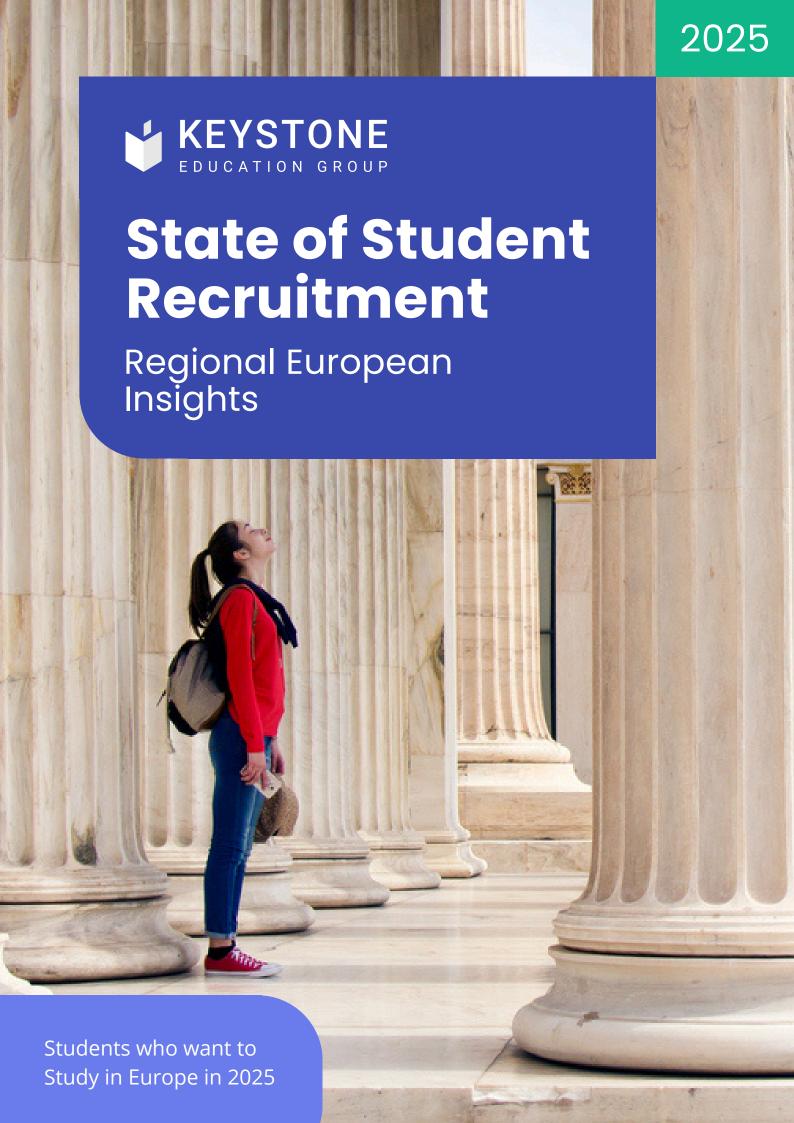

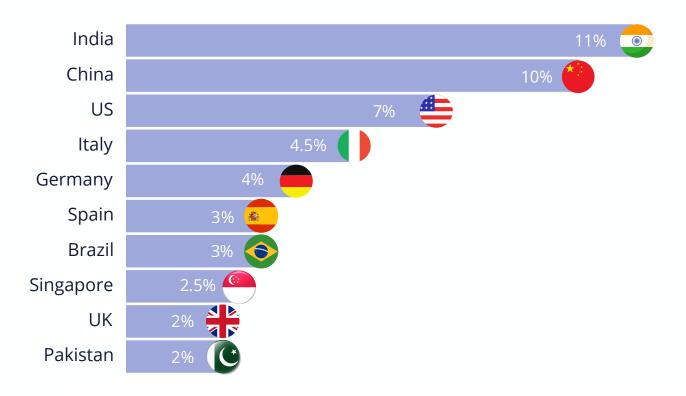






# Students who want to study in France

## Top nationalities interested in studying in France in 2025





We see a larger proportion of search interest in France coming from Africa and South Asia than we do for all European study destinations, with India accounting for 11% of searches.

There is considerable interest in studying in France from within Europe itself, with 31% of European students saying France is their top study destination.



### Student perceptions of French university education

When it comes to France, survey data shows international students are primarily drawn by its rich cultural appeal (47%).

It is also seen as more affordable than Spain and Germany, and Europe collectively as a destination. However, its institutions don't have as strong a reputation as neighbouring countries.

of students interested in French study options said they are most influenced by the subjects and study options that are available in France.

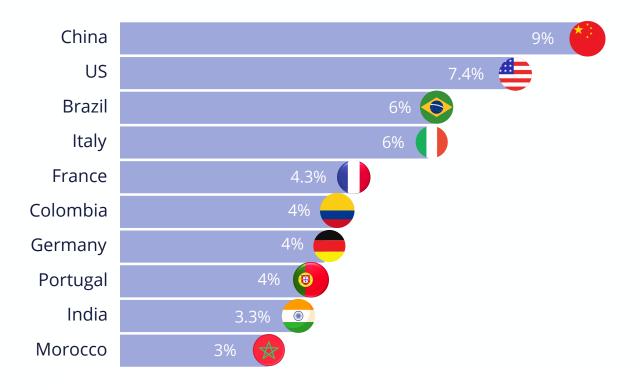
This is higher than the overall European average (57%) and for Germany (54%) and Spain (51%).

# Top nationalities interested in studying in Spain in 2025



Unsurprisingly, **interest from South America** is higher here than we see for other European destinations, such as Germany or France.

What may be more surprising is only one native Spanish-speaking country (Colombia) appears in the top 10.

The next highest regional share comes from the U.S., with **China** representing the highest share of search actions for Spanish study.

In fact, China is the largest single source of searches, accounting for 9% of all global searches.



## Student perceptions of Spanish university education

For Spain, the data shows that international students are primarily motivated by its **cultural appeal** (48%), which is the highest across all European destinations.

At the same time, academic and institutional factors such as **reputation** (29%) and **subjects offered** (28%) scored the lowest among the countries compared, suggesting that Spain's attraction lies more in personal and cultural experiences than in perceived academic prestige.

#### Blended study important to students in Spain



of students interested in Spanish study want to complete **a mix of on campus and online study**, compared to **11%** of all **European study** destinations.

On campus study remains the most popular mode of study, with 73% of students interested in Spanish options wanting to study on campus.



#### Spain: A destination for adventure

For many international students, the desire "to have an adventure" is a powerful motivation when choosing where to study in Europe.

In Spain, this sense of adventure is especially strong, as the country offers a unique blend of rich culture, vibrant social life, and diverse landscapes.



## Instagram as the most popular social media platform that influences students

For Spain, **Instagram** (31%) is the most influential platform shaping students' study abroad decisions, followed by YouTube (20%) and TikTok (17%).

This shows that students interested in Spain are highly responsive to visual and experience-based content.

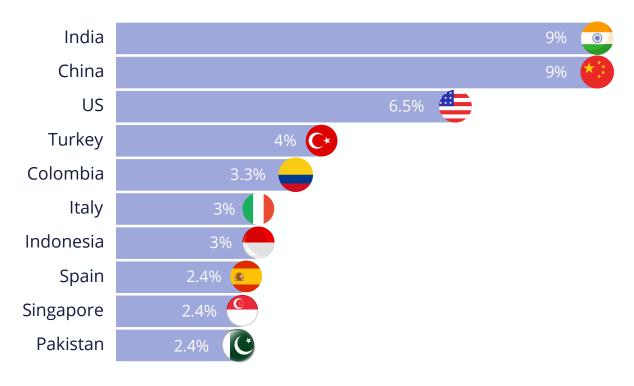






# Students who want to study in **Germany**

# Top nationalities interested in studying in Germany in 2025



International interest in Germany is less European-centric, with only around a quarter of searches coming from European audiences.



Interest from East Asia and South Asia remains strong, together accounting for 28% of all searches.

The top 10 countries highlight an increasingly global audience.

Seven of them are located outside Europe, including North America, South America, South Asia, Southeast Asia, and East Asia.



## Student perceptions of German university education

When it comes to Germany, the data shows that international students are primarily attracted by its strong **institutional reputation** (51%) and the **range of subjects** offered (43%), confirming its status as a hub for high-quality education.

However, with lower scores for affordability (26%) and culture (35%), students appear driven more by academic and career goals than by lifestyle factors.

Post-study work visas are also a major draw for students interested in Germany, influencing **45%** - more than for any other leading European destination. This factor has grown in importance, rising from 36% in 2024, highlighting Germany's appeal for those seeking career opportunities after graduation.

### Students interested in Germany applying to more universities than on average



of students interested in German study will apply to **5+ universities**. This is more than with Europe in general (29%) and for Spain (28%).
